

#### **Worship Notes**

Today is Reformation Sunday, commemorating October 31, 1517, when Martin Luther walked up to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenburg, Germany, with a hammer in his hand. Church doors were sort of a bulletin board of the day. Luther nailed a list of 95 things about church and theology that he'd like to talk about. Though the idea of reformation had been floating around for a while, it was after Luther's action that the Protestant movement bloomed.

Presbyterians are the Scottish branch of what is known as the Reformed tradition. Scottish pastor John Knox was a student of John Calvin, a French Reformer, in Geneva, Switzerland. Calvin's ideas are present in our service today. Each worship service began with the reading of Psalm 124:8, as did ours this morning. The prayer of confession is based on a prayer of confession from 1525 attributed to John Oecolampadius (1482-1531). The Decalogue – what we call the Ten Commandments – was read following the prayer of confession. This morning our Summary of the Law is based on the work of Eugenia Gamble in *Love Carved in Stone*, the 2019-2020 PW Bible study. The reading and proclamation of the Word were placed in the middle of the service, symbolizing the place of God's Word at the center of Christian life. The singing was all Psalms in Calvin's church. We've moved beyond just the Psalms, but today's anthem, "A Mighty Fortress" is a paraphrase of Psalm 46.

Today we also observe All Saints' Day (November 1). On All Saints Day we rejoice in all who through the ages have faithfully served the Lord. Our first hymn, "For All the Saints," is set to a tune called "Sine Nomine," literally "without a name." That might refer to all the saints of God who, though unnamed in history, are nevertheless named and cherished in our hearts.

## "A Mighty Fortress" (anthem)

A mighty fortress is our God, a bulwark never failing;

Our helper he, amid the flood of mortal ills prevailing:

For still our ancient foe doth seek to work us woe;

His craft and power are great, and, armed with cruel hate, on earth is not his equal.

Did we in our own strength confide, our striving would be losing;

Were not the right man on our side, the man of God's own choosing;

Dost ask who that may be? Christ Jesus, it is he;

Lord Sabaoth, his name, from age to age the same, and he must win the battle.

A mighty fortress is our God!
