Advent Devotional

We all know what a Chrismon Tree is, but do you know about the Jesse Tree? Isaiah 11:1 says: A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots. Springing from this text, the Jesse Tree is a practice that remembers the people and stories in Hebrew scripture that tell the story of God's relationship with humanity right up to the birth of Jesus. Each day of Advent there is another story to read from scripture and an ornament to color. You can have a tree or branch as a dedicated "Jesse Tree" or simply hang these ornaments on your Christmas tree. During Advent we remember that even as we are waiting for Jesus' return, God's people in Hebrew scripture were waiting for the Messiah, God's anointed one. Join with your church family in this Advent devotional practice. The list of readings and the ornaments to color are in the hallways outside the sanctuary.



At the beginning of both Matthew's and Luke's gospels, Jesus' genealogy is recited. If you compare the two family trees, however, you'll see that they don't match exactly. Matthew's genealogy (Matthew 1:1-17), believed to have been written to a community of Jewish Christians, traces Jesus' ancestry back to Abraham, the father of the Jews. Luke's genealogy (Luke 3:21-38) traces Jesus' ancestry back to Adam (and God). Who do you suppose Luke's original audience was? Why do you think these gospel writers believed it was important to include a genealogy?

Why didn't they include the same genealogy?
