THIS WEEK IN CHURCH HISTORY

August 22, 565: Celtic missionary and abbot Columba confronts a monster at Loch Ness, becoming the first recorded observer of the creature. "At the voice of the saint, the monster was terrified," writes his biographer, "and fled more quickly than if it had been pulled back with ropes."

August 23-25, 1572: The St. Bartholomew's Day Massacre

On August 23, Catherine de Medici, mother of King Charles IX of France, plotted the assassination of Admiral Gaspard de Coligny*, leader of the Huguenots (French Protestant Calvinists) as part of France's ongoing religious wars. Coligny survived the attempt, but on August 24 (St. Bartholomew's Day), the King gave an order that all Huguenot leaders should be killed. Coligny was stabbed, his body thrown from a window, mutilated, and ultimately decapitated. Catholic mobs and troops throughout Paris massacred as many as 70,000 Protestants over the next two days. Though Spain and the Vatican approved, most European nations were appalled. France's religious wars continued until 1598 when King Henry IV issued the Edict of Nantes, granting tolerance to Protestants. Successive kings eroded the rights given in the Edict, and in 1685 Louis XIV revoked the Edict entirely and embarked on active persecution of Protestants. Hundreds of thousands of French Protestants fled France. In April of 1680 the ship Richmond arrived in Charleston (SC) with 45 French Protestants (Huguenots) aboard. More refugees followed, and in 1687, a Huguenot church was built on what is now the corner of Church St. and Queen St. in downtown Charleston.

*If you've been to Hilton Head Island, you may have seen Coligny Beach, Coligny Beach Park, and/or Coligny Plaza. They are named for Admiral Gaspard de Coligny, who sponsored two expeditions to what would become South Carolina, in the search for places of safety and freedom for colonies of French Protestants.



The Joseph cycle also introduces another theme that would become important in later postexilic literature: the threat of its hero's assimilation into the dominant foreign culture that surrounds him (Daniel 1-6; Ezra 10:2-4; Nehemiah 13:23-27). Joseph is given an Egyptian name and marries the daughter of an Egyptian priest. The names that he gives to his children suggest that he prefers to forget his past. At least outwardly, he becomes indistinguishable from those around him, so much so that he is not recognized by his own brothers. Their arrival in Egypt forces Joseph to confront his past and reclaim his identity as a son of Israel.
