THIS WEEK IN CHURCH HISTORY

November 20, 303: Because his prisons are full, the Roman Emperor Diocletian offers amnesty to all Christians who will sacrifice to the Roman gods. Eusebius, in his Martyrs of Palestine, records the case of one man who after being brought to an altar, had his hands seized and made to complete a sacrificial offering. The clergyman was told that his act of sacrifice had been recognized and was summarily dismissed. Others were told they had sacrificed even when they had done nothing

November 22, 1963: Death of C. S. Lewis, beloved apologist, scholar and author. His works include *The Chronicles of Narnia*, *The Screwtape Letters*, *Surprised by Joy*, and *Mere Christianity*.

November 24, 1572: Death in Edinburgh of John Knox, the most notable of the reformers of Scotland.



The "Song of Deborah" in Judges 5 is considered some of the most ancient material in scripture. This poem is a celebration of a mighty victory wrought by Israel over the Canaanites and their general Sisera. When the poem opens there is near-anarchy in Israel -- village life is abandoned, travelers avoid the highways, and the people have chosen new gods. At the center of the poem is Deborah, who arose as "a mother in Israel" (v. 7) to lead the people, with God's help.
